PRIMARY SCHOOL

FROM THE COORDINATOR

A Tawney Frogmouth sat up in the high school on Tuesday, alone and on the veranda. 2 unusual things for the bird to do. In the morning when we first saw it, it was asleep and had its beak up looking very much like the branch it mimics but it was still there at lunchtime despite the children walking below it to and from classes and band practice and music lessons happening around it. After school it had moved onto a nearby Jarrah tree and a number or children paused their conversations as they walked passed and casually said hello and goodbye as if it was the most natural thing in the world.

When is an Owl not an Owl? When it is a Tawny Frogmouth!

This unwitting 'false owl' is responsible for much confusion in the world of Owls. The fact is, this bird is not an owl at all. Owls belong to the order of **Strigiformes**, while Tawny Frogmouths (*Podargus strigoides*) are sometimes placed in the order of **Coraciiformes** which, in Australia, includes kingfishers and kookaburras.

The reasons for the confusion are plain to see. Here is a bird with the same mottled, cryptic pattern as an Owl, with wide eyes, and keeping the same nocturnal habits as many owl species. Further adding to the confusion is that the call of the Southern Boobook Owl (*Ninox boobook*) is often wrongly attributed to the Tawny Frogmouth. It is for this reason, that the Tawny Frogmouth is sometimes incorrectly referred to as a Morepork, or Mopoke.

Bill (Beak)	Wide, gaping, forward facing. Used to catch insects.	Narrow, sharp, powerful, downwards facing. Used to tear prey apart.
Toes & Talons	Slender, weak. Used only for perching.	Thick, powerful. Used to catch and kill prey.
Nesting	Usually builds nest in tree fork.	Uses tree hollow or nest of another bird.
Roosting	Out in open, relying on ability to look like a branch when threatened by predators.	Hidden in thick foliage, will be mobbed if discovered by other birds.
Food	Mainly insects, sometimes small vertebrates. Caught with bill.	Small mammals. Smaller Owls tend to eat insects. Caught with feet.

JAKURLI: PEARL SHELL

In the spirit of the Mayor of Cockburn's speech at the Reconciliation ceremony earlier this year..."It is time that this generation of young people learn the truth of Colonisation", the Wardong students in Class 7 are preparing a play called 'JAKURLI', (Yawuru for pearl shell).

Bardi Riji

Pearl shell has always been an important part of the North West tribes: the Bardi, Yawuru, Nyulnyul, Jugan and many others. For hundreds of years the Yolgnu people of Arnhem Land traded with the Macassans of Sulawesi and other Islander folk. Shell was also used in the rites of initiation for young boys. When carved with the designs of the tribe, it was known as the Riji.

The women made jewellery and the children used the pearls to play their 'marble' games.

When the Settlers realised that using their native unpaid workers to gather shell rather than the task of keeping sheep and cattle, many Settlers became rich quickly. However, the realisation of impending wealth also brought thousands flooding into the North West.

When shell could not be gathered by the shore as it became very depleted, the Aboriginal workers were forced further and further out to sea. Eventually, this resulted in the practice of 'Skin Diving'.

The demand for shell and pearls was high on the English and American markets. In the Northern Hemisphere, the shell was used to create knife handles, parts for instruments and pearl buttons.

As 'divers' became scarce the lucrative business of Blackbirding came into being. This was the kidnapping of young males and females from inland tribes bordering Broome or Nuleribanjen as it was known by the Yawuru.



The students are learning language and songs not heard for a century and hope to bring this gift to an audience.




Library Books of the week:

Children and their temperaments by Marieke Anschutz (pictured to the right). Drawing on ancient tradition, Rudolf Steiner referred to four fundamental 'types' or 'temperaments' in the human personality, each of which, he said, has different personal needs and ways of relating socially.

The following two books are written by Kermann Koepke, a Swiss Waldorf teacher of many years experience who is well known in Europe:

Encountering the self, transformation and destiny in the ninth year by Hermann Koepke. Between the ages of nine and ten, as their *I* incarnates more deeply, children often experience themselves for the first time as separate individuals, different from their parents and peers, and essentially alone. This inner experience is sometimes precipitated by a first encounter with death in the child's

environment, a first inkling that life is fragile and does not go on forever. Hermann Koepke provides a lucid and highly readable explanation of the outer signs and symptoms of this essential turning point in the life of a child.

The course, offered through Rudolf Steiner College Perth, is aimed at teachers, parents and anyone interested in practical Anthroposophy.



Italian Apple Cake

3 eggs
1kg (4-6) apples, any variety
1 cup sugar
120g raisins
90g melted butter
1 cup SR flour
grated rind and juice 1 lemon
2 tsp vanilla

Topping:
1tblspn raw sugar
3 tblspn ground cinnamon
100g pumpkin seeds(or
similar)

- 1. Beat eggs and sugar until thick and mousse like.
- 2. Add melted butter, vanilla, lemon juice and zest, mix together.
- 3. Peel and chop apple into chunky pieces (6-8)
- 4. Place chopped apples in the base of a greased bottom lined and floured 25cm cake tin (can also use two smaller tins.)
- 5. Sprinkle raisins on apples.
- 6. Fold sifted flour through egg mix then pour batter over apples and raisins.
- Sprinkle seeds over top of cake batter and then mixed cinnamon sugar.
- 8. Bake 170°C for 1-1.5 hours.
- 9. Cake should be well risen. Test with skewer to ensure centre is cooked.
- Allow to rest 20 mines in tin (will fall apart if turned out while too hot.
- 11. To serve sprinkle with icing sugar.
- Best served warm or at room temperature.
