The shadow side, the small part of us may look at yesterday's headline...

"WA State School Teacher's Union Pushes to Scrap NAPLAN for Grade 3 Children and Focus More on Play in the Early Years" and want to scream "Told you so!"

Waldorf Education has been advocating the vital importance of play for the last 100 years. This is based on an understanding of the stages of human development and the need to develop the will forces in the younger years. This way children enter Class One when they turn seven, keen and able to learn through a structured, creative curriculum that engages and enriches their feeling life and all their senses. Instead, our bigger selves, the one that lives in the light of goodness, beauty and truth say "Yay" and with gratitude hopes our state's education leadership catches up for the sake of healthy childhood development.

Here are some key points of how the Union of Teachers argues the point:

- Formalised testing needs to be scrapped for children aged under eight in favour of a play-based model of learning favoured in Scandinavian countries.
- Teachers fear tests are having a **negative effect** on children and teachers
- Research shows testing develops **anxiety** in children
- **Play-based learning is better** for children in terms of wellbeing, academic outcomes, problem-solving and social skills.
- The outcomes in Finland have consistently been the best in the world yet they
 don't have a regime of standardised testing. They don't have the focus on
 measurement and accountability that we have in the UK, the US and in
 Australia. None of those three countries are demonstrating excellent
 outcomes despite narrow measurement and accountability processes.
- Children are not given the opportunity to discover, create, interact and gain confidence when they are being inundated with an overloaded curriculum
- Children develop anxiety because of formal expectations beyond their normal developmental stages.
- Many young children were required to start learning to read and write before they were ready to do so, which led to behavioural problems and adverse academic outcomes.
- Focusing on child-centred learning through play was better for children's overall development.
- The Government needs to recognise the importance of play the research is absolutely clear about how important it is to children's development.

Congratulations to all the people involved in last week's **Class 11/12 Drama "Hotel Paradiso"**. Special thanks to all the parents that got involved and helped. Lovely to see so many former students come back and watch the production. Great community spirit!

It's a well worn cry from our little one: "but I'm not cold! No!". They so often resist putting on socks and shoes, jumpers and jackets. A parent will often be heard to say "she doesn't seem to feel the cold". We adults are charged with all the patience to ensure their warmth for healthy development, because the child does not have the capacity to know or regulate a healthy body temperature until they are much older! So persist with patient repetition dear parent. The warm child is the happy and healthy child. Two layers on top, two layers below. Some of our kindy children need 2 changes of clothes packed in their school bag this term. Happy puddling!

The Importance of Warmth

The quality of warmth is little appreciated and often misunderstood. But we cannot even discuss health without addressing the subject of warmth. Warmth is necessary for growth and warmth supports all healing. Loss of warmth often leads to illness.

As you may know, children only gradually grow into the ability to sense temperature. By age nine, children fully know if they are hot or cold, but not before. As infants they are very open and vulnerable to their surroundings, losing or absorbing heat rapidly (that's why hats are essential).

We caregivers and parents can judge if there is an abnormality of warmth distribution simply by laying a hand – preferably warm – on the hands, feet, limbs or flanks and comparing to a protected area such as the tummy. Cold hands are a good indication of the need for more clothing!

Dressing for Health

To dress a person well during the coldest months - that is for optimum health, or if there is an illness;

- Three layers on the top half of the body
- Two layers on the bottom ·
- A warm hat (and coat outdoors)

Singlets are necessary all year round – tuck in the waist-line to avoid gaps so that liver heat is retained. Hats or bonnets are always vital for babies and young children during summer and winter; they protect the delicate brain enclosure from air conditioning, sun, cold and heat and will help prevent headaches later.

Keeping the feet warm is important for adults and children of all ages. Wool/fleece 'house slippers' are an excellent method of supporting health and can be worn in all but the hottest weather. We (Australians) are notoriously casual about dressing warmly, to our disadvantage in the long-term.

Natural fabrics breath best. Layer you clothing; if you sweat, one layer can be removed. The skin gives off heat to the surrounding air unless we protect it. Try dressing the family

in woollen underwear – find a supplier of pure, fine (not crude) wool clothing. There are woollen singlets and spencers available which have a knitted cotton inner lining. They are soft, warm, protective and machine washable - lasting well with minimal care. God and sheep worked along time to give us the gift of warmth – giving wool!

FROM THE COORDINATOR

Dr Michaela Glöckler is a world renound and respected Anthroposophical doctor, author and lecturer and one of the thing she does is challenge our relationship with technology. She asks the deep questions: What consequences will information technology have for the healthy development of children and adolescence? What perspectives open up when we consider the development of technology itself?

The following example makes it very clear that we need to be consider these questions.

Achim Berg, president of BITKOM (Germany's Federal Association of IT, Telecom and New Media), was quoted on 30th July 2019 in the "Rheinische Post": "I recommend that all children be given mobile phones from primary school onwards and would encourage their use as teaching aids".

Berg's comments are not only in the interests of economy - they are closely linked to the political campaign around 5G. This is attached to the 'smart' or 'safe' city campaign to protect the population against risk. This protection can only be given if a person's location is known via people's smart phones and the stream of information is checked, analysed and controlled.

To meet such a future we need the humane, cultural values of people with a strong will and independent thinking capacity. **www.eliant.eu**.

We need to continue campaigning for 5G moratoriums until the health risks have been adequately investigated says Dr Glöckler.




